If ANY household members exhibit any symptoms of COVID-19, even if mild, OR if they have been exposed to a COVID-19 positive person, OR if anyone in the household tests positive for COVID-19, that they must:

- 1. Contact the health department or their medical provider for guidance on testing
- 2. Immediately self-isolate the household until medically cleared
- 3. Notify the child(ren)'s caseworker(s) and the licensing worker within the same business day



Emergency Placement

Emergency placements is when a child is placed into your home after normal business hours and typically are only 14day placements unless you would like to continue to be the long-term placement.

Emergency placements are typically immediate emergency removals. WCHSA caseworkers attempt to contact our resource families during these emergency times to take placement of the child(ren) with almost no notice and limited information. Reaching you during these emergency situations is critical to help reduce trauma for our foster youth. If you receive a phone call or text outside of normal business hours, including the middle of the night, we are graciously asking that answer the phone and consider opening your home to our kids in crisis. The caseworkers will leave messages so please keep an eye out and contact the caseworker back as soon as possible whether or not you are able to take placement of the child(ren). Additionally, when WCHSA's caseworkers are calling it could be multiple different numbers.

Questions regarding Autism Spectrum

Disorder- The National Institute of Mental Health explains that Autism is known as a "spectrum" disorder because there is wide variation in the type and severity of symptoms people experience. ASD occurs in all ethnic, racial, and economic groups. Although ASD can be a lifelong disorder, treatments and services can improve a person's symptoms and ability to function. 0.5 hours

Explaining Disruptive Mood Dysregulation

Disorder (DMDD)-The DSM-5 Diagnostic Criteria for Disruptive Mood Dysregulation Disorder includes terms such as temper outbursts, verbal rage, physical aggression toward people or property and those with this diagnosis are described as irritable or angry and can only be given to children between 6-18 years old. DMDD as it is referred was reportedly added to the DSM to decrease the number of children who are diagnosed with Bipolar Disorder. 0.5 hours

Understanding Trauma Related Disorders-

Per the National Child Traumatic Stress Network, the impact of child traumatic stress can last well beyond childhood. In fact, research has shown that child trauma survivors may experience: learning problems, including lower grades and more suspensions and expulsions, an increased use of health and mental health services, increased involvement with the child welfare and juvenile justice systems and long-term health problems (e.g., diabetes and heart disease). Let's discuss how trauma is a risk factor for nearly all behavioral health and substance use disorders. 0.5 hours

Identifying Anxiety Disorders in Child

Welfare-The National Institute of Mental Health lists the symptoms of a Generalized Anxiety Disorder as feeling restless, wound-up, or on-edge, being easily fatigued, having difficulty concentrating; being irritable and having sleep problems, such as difficulty falling or staying asleep, restlessness, or unsatisfying sleep and these issues usually impact a person's daily living activities.0.5 hours

<u>Healthy Boundaries in Sexual and Intimate</u>

Partner Relationships-This presentation introduces the importance of boundaries in intimate partner relationships and provides communication tools for talking to youth about asserting and accepting healthy boundaries. 0.5 hours

<u>A Discussion on Attention Deficit</u> Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) in Child

Welfare-According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) is one of the most common neurodevelopmental disorders of childhood. It is usually first diagnosed in childhood and often lasts into adulthood. Children with ADHD may have trouble paying attention, controlling impulsive behaviors (may act without thinking about what the result will be), or be overly active. Dr. Kristopher Kaliebe, Child and Adolescent Psychiatrist is available to discuss this diagnosis as well as answer specific questions related to the disorder.0.5 hours

UPDATES AND INFORMATION

Changing Schools

- Did you know that for every school change, foster youth lose an average of 6 months of education? Crazy right?!
- WCHSA has a specific process in place to approve school changes and we take this very seriously. It is our legal responsibility to do our due diligence to evaluate and determine the Best Interest of students to ensure educational stability for our foster youth. Federal and State law protect our little ones, so they don't have to change schools with every placement change.
- Please reach out to your worker for further information on this process if you feel a youth should change schools. WCHSA leadership legally MUST approve school changes.

Changing Mode of Instruction

• Youth changing from distance to in-person learning – the schools need between 3 days and 2 weeks to ensure the proper resources are in place to accommodate the student

Technology

- WCHSA is teaming up with WCSD to make sure all foster youth have a computer to complete their schoolwork. This only applies to youth who are attending school through full-time distance learning or on a hybrid schedule.
- "Digital Daze" due to smoke, etc. do not require kids to have a computer if they are attending school in person. Schools are providing instruction to families and take homework for these types of crazy days.

Distance Learning – Supportive facilities

Transportation

- If you have a question regarding a student's bus route, PLEASE reach out to your worker, rather than calling WCSD Dispatch for these types of questions.
- Don't forget that you can be reimbursed for mileage if a bus route was requested through your worker and "officially" denied. Your worker will initiate the contract with WCSD through Claire Potichkin.

Special Education Services

- A lot of IEPs are being revised this fall, due to delays created by COVID, etc. It is very important for foster parents and workers to participate in this process.
- IEPs are also being revised due to change in "mode" of instruction. Service delivery is modified for Distance Learning, so please feel free to seek clarification from the school if no formal meeting was held for this type of revision.
- New IEP evaluations: If the team feels that your youth should be evaluated for Special Education services, it is very important to meet with the school to address the students' needs and discuss the supports already in place, best next steps, etc. It's a team effort and the IEP team drives the process. IEP teams for the most part include the school psychologist, teacher, case manager, foster parent, social worker, WIN worker, CASA (if applicable), other school administration (principals or Aps often participate at the elementary level) and dependency attorney if they want to participate.
