Car Seat Update

There has been an update that went into effect on January 1st, 2022, regarding child passengers and safety for the state of Nevada.

Previously, a child passenger must use a child restraint system until they are at least 6 years old and 60 pounds. This has change started at the beginning of the new year.

The state will eliminate the weight requirement and has instead replaced it with a height requirement.

Children passengers less than 6 years old **and less than 57 inches tall**, (that's 4'9") must ride in an approved child restraint system.

They have also added that children under 2 years of age must ride in a rear-facing child safety seat.

This is the minimum requirement set forth by the state but remember that we always want to select the safest restraint system for our children.

For questions about fit or seat selection, please reach out to me.

An EPSDT (early periodic screening, diagnostic, and treatment) exam **MUST** be scheduled within 7 days of a child entering foster care and periodically thereafter (see the screening schedule [here](#)). Please invite and inform biological parents to participate and attend appointments unless prohibited from doing so by the case manager. Additionally, it is your responsibility to keep the agency updated on medical, dental, vision, behavioral health, and emergency appointments for a child in your care. In order for the agency to create and maintain an accurate "medical passport" for all children, please fill out the **MonthlyMedHistoryForm-Washoe.pdf** (qpinevada.org) and email it to your caseworker.

Buckle Up!

The Laws of Nevada
Nevada Revised Statutes require front and rear seat occupants of almost all passenger vehicles to wear safety belts or ride in an approved child restraint system. (NRS 484D.495 and 484B.157)

The Laws of Physics
If you crash or slam on your brakes, your car comes to a sudden stop. But you will keep moving until you, too, are stopped – by the windshield, dashboard, pavement or seat belt.



Air Bags

Air bags are more effective when you're buckled up and can be dangerous if you're not. You should be seated at least 10" away from the air bag as measured from the center of the steering wheel to your breastbone.

Air bags should be turned off only for those with certain medical conditions, those who cannot sit 10" away and when transporting young children in the front seat.

Never place a rear-facing child safety seat in front of an air bag! Children under 12 should ride in the back.

Expectant mothers should buckle up and leave the air bag on. Never place the lap belt above or on your belly.



Did you know?

Seven of ten child safety seats are installed improperly. Free inspections and advice are offered throughout Nevada. Call 866-SEAT-CHECK or visit seatcheck.org to find one in your area.



Child Seat Law

Any child less than 6 years of age who is less than 57 inches tall must ride in an approved child restraint system. Children under 2 years old must ride in a rear-facing safety seat in the back seat of the vehicle. (NRS 484B.157 effective January 1, 2022)

Best Practices

Keep children in the back seat until at least age 12. Select a car seat based on your child's age and size and use it every time.

Birth – 2 Years

Use a rear-facing car seat through age 1 and until your baby reaches the seat manufacturer's height and weight limits.

2 – 3 Years

Keep your child rear-facing as long as possible. Then use a forward-facing toddler seat with a harness until your toddler outgrows that seat's limits.

4 – 7 Years

Once your child has outgrown the seat with a harness, use a booster seat until he or she is large enough for seat belts. Stay in the back seat.

8 – 12 Years

Use safety belts once they fit properly. The lap belt should lie across the thighs, not the stomach. The shoulder belt should not cross the neck or face.

Seat Belt Tips

Never use just a lap belt across a child sitting in a booster seat designed for shoulder belts.

Never use pillows, books, or towels to boost a child. They can slide around and hit the occupant.

Never put a shoulder belt behind anyone's arm or back because it eliminates the protection for the upper part of the body and increases the risk of severe injury in a crash.

Kids Aren't Cargol

Passengers under 18 may not ride in the back of a pickup or flatbed truck. This does not apply to farming and ranching activity, parades or to camper shells or slide-in campers. (NRS 484B.160)

COVID-19 CORNER

If **ANY** household members exhibit any symptoms of COVID-19, even if mild, **OR** if they have been exposed to a COVID-19 positive person, **OR** if anyone in the household tests positive for COVID-19, that they must:

1. Contact the health department or their medical provider for guidance on testing.
2. Immediately self-isolate the household until medically cleared. This includes any in-person contact including visitation, meetings, appointments etc.
3. Notify the child(ren)'s caseworker(s) and the licensing worker within the same business day.

Providing Support to Youth Who Have Experienced Toxic Stress

This video provides an overview of adverse childhood experiences and toxic stress, how toxic stress shows up in behavior and beliefs, as well as how to support youth who have experienced or are experiencing toxic stress. Presented by licensed Marriage and Family Therapist, Barbara Lankamp-Kochis. (0.5 hour)

Tools for Maintaining African American Hair

This training addresses questions many foster parents have about caring for ethnic hair types. The training interviews two barbers on hair care routines, needs, and how to maintain the hair of foster youth. Many foster parents have questions and want to hear it from the experts. (0.5 hour)

Creating Permanency for Youth

Youth transitioning out of foster care often come out at a disadvantage. The norm they had grown accustomed to where supportive adults fulfill specific needs typically comes to an end when they leave foster care. However, that's when they actually need more supportive people and this training addresses the need. This training is designed to help caretakers have the conversations needed to discover the supports youth will have when they leave care. (1.5 hour)

Taking the Blame Off Kids: Understanding Systems and the Ecological Model

Exploration of the Ecological Model as an effective way of understanding family dynamics and individual behavior within larger systems and communities. This presentation includes information specific to children and youth in foster care. (0.5 hour)

Child Centered Strategies for Supporting Families

Children from hard places manifest the trauma they have experienced in many different ways. Caregivers report the child in their care acting out in ways such as running away, lying, stealing, and arguing but also with children who shut down, become isolated, and stop communicating. Despite the services and trainings available to support families, caregivers often report they continue to feel unprepared and not provided with adequate tools to support children who display significant intensity of behaviors in their home display. This panel will provide a brief overview of recent media events highlighting caregiver's responses to the behaviors of the children in their homes and engage participants in a discussion in approaches to assist in the moment. The panel will be interactive, providing a significant question and answer segment as well (1.5 hour)

Court Information

HSA has updated the **Court Notification Policy**. There were changes made to the policy to help provide our resource parents with court information in a timely manner.

In addition to the policy the **Caregiver's Update on Child Form** was also updated. This form will still be mailed to you but in case you don't receive it or if it gets lost it will also be stored on the QPI website for your convience. ([Business Casual Letterhead Template \(qpinevada.org\)](http://qpinevada.org)) This form is to be completed and returned to the Court Liaison Unit by its due date, which is 5 business days prior to the hearing. This form is to help ensure that your voice is heard whether you are in court to provide updates or if you are unable to attend.

The **Waiver of Notice by US Mail** is on the following page. This waiver is to be filled out and provided if you wish to receive all court notifications and documentation by email instead of the US Postal Services. This form would have to be filled out for each case that is in your home. Therefore, one should be completed for sibling groups. However, if you have two or more foster children in your home that are part of different cases then you would have to complete two or more forms. This will be a form that will consistently have to be filled out as new foster children are placed with you. FAQ – Educational Quick Facts re. Youth in Foster Care

INCLUDING important WCHSA policy updates!!

(Updated 9/30/21)

Did you know??

- **SCHOOL OF ATTENDANCE:** Foster youth have the right to remain at their School of Origin (see definition at end of document) when they come into care and/or change placements – even if it’s an adoptive placement - to reduce additional disruptions and maintain their educational stability.
 - **WHY?**
 - Often the school they attend when they come into care is the “only” stable environment in their world – while parents and placements are in flux.
 - Statistically, foster youth lose an average of 6 months of education for every school move/disruption.
 - WCHSA is bound by State and National legislation, to ensure that every effort is made to maintain our foster youth in their School of Origin.
 - IF it is determined to be in the best interest of the student to change schools, it **MUST** be approved by WCHSA leadership. This process is coordinated through the student’s worker and the WCHSA educational liaison.
 - Foster Parents, relatives and fictive kid **CANNOT** change a youth’s school without proper approval through WCHSA.
- **TRANSPORTATION:** Mileage reimbursement is available to whomever is assisting with transportation if there is no bus available. This applies to “anyone” transporting the youth, while the case is open.
 - The district tracks the miles, so you don’t have to! The reimbursement is one round trip, based on mapped miles between school and placement address and is disbursed once a month (electronic payments are available!) for the prior month of transport.
- **STRONG COMMUNICATION IS KEY**
 - The relationship with your student’s school is your first line of defense in providing support.
 - Communicate with your worker when things get confusing or challenging.
 -
- **INFINITE CAMPUS:** Get acquainted with Infinite Campus to follow student progress – provide kudos earned and track missing assignments. “It takes a village” and caregivers are an essential part of that village!
- **WCSD Board of Trustees** meets (almost) every other Tuesday, so if you would like to be “in the know” and have the opportunity to have your voice heard, please tune in! <https://www.washoeschools.net/domain/168>
- **SUPPORT:**
 - **WCHSA Educational Liaison & WCSD Foster Liaison** work together to support all things education! Your case worker can reach out when things get sticky!
 - **TUTORING** is always available. Be sure to check with your worker.

Family Engagement Center (FEC) Resource

Accessing new clothing, diapers, shoes, etc. for kiddos coming into care is difficult for most resource families to do at the ‘drop of a hat’. I am happy to announce that with ‘leftover’ monies from our 2020 Pennington Foundation grant, the FEC was able to purchase a large amount of new clothing items and diapers for kiddos. At this time, however, the items purchased are **ONLY** for **NEW** kids coming into care. If you receive a new placement, give the FEC a call (775-352-3230) or stop by (905 E. Prater Way in Sparks) to gather a few of the following items for kiddos 0-18:

- **Diapers/wipes (including pull-ups, goodnites, etc.)**
- **Shoes**
- **Socks**
- **Underwear**
- **Pajamas**
- **Shorts and T-shirts.**
- **Bathing suits**
- **Hygiene items**
- **Etc.**

In addition, for any foster home that has African American children, we have a large **supply of ethnic hair care products** just for them.
